I am Chris Cole and as best I can recall it was about 1973 when I met Mike. He had just arrived at BYU as a freshman and was looking for a place to live. While he was an 18-year old 'kid', the five of us were all in our early 20s and had each served an LDS mission - so you could almost call it somewhat of a generation gap. Even so, he fit in perfectly and I enjoyed him very much. Our apartment did a lot of group dating together and Mike always pushed through his shyness to participate. My stand out memory is of Mike's amazing study habits as he focused on his dream of becoming a doctor. He always seemed to be glued to the desk in our bedroom. You may recall Mike having quite the romance with a young lady in Provo named Melanie. She is my cousin and I introduced them. Some time in the 90's another cousin of mine had a dramatic head injury in Florida, close to where Mike was coincidentally doing a fellowship. He went to the hospital to do some 'recon' for us with the doctors and that was very comforting. Over the decades I probably reached out to Mike perhaps 4-5 times, just to catch up. In our latest conversation a few years ago he shared with me some of his personal issues. I adored and respected Mike and I am so sad to hear of his passing. From all accounts, his was a life filled with meaningful service and compassion. In his passing the world has truly lost an genuine impact player for good.
